Heavy stuff can fall off shelves and harm employees. Forklifts and other machines carry inherent dangers since they manipulate heavily laden pallets. Incorrect lifting is a common source of back injuries. Even nails, splinters and box cutters can result in harm.

Warehouse conditions could change from one moment to the next, depending on the substances or materials being handling, the job being carried out and the machine being used. Due to the different possible hazards in warehouse environment, warehouse operations are regulated by many different standards. There are regulations for material handling and storage, for working and walking surfaces, and rules governing the selection and use of PPE (personal protective equipment).

The majority of the safety rules covered by a company will consist of common sense rules. Regulations that warehouse employees should be quite familiar with include:

- 1. Safety is a priority at all times while working in a warehouse.
- 2. PPE, like for instance gloves, safety shoes, hard hats and eye protection, should be worn as appropriate.
- 3. Possible hazards must be checked and reported.
- 4. Know warning signs and signals and obey them.
- 5. Pay attention to the job you are performing.
- 6. Pay attention to what others are performing nearby particularly forklifts and various dangerous machinery.
- 7. Stack and store materials so that they're stable and secure.

To ensure a safe warehouse, workers should adhere to good housekeeping rules. Basic rules for housekeeping involves keeping the aisles and floors clear of objects such as wires and cords. Never perch objects insecurely on a surface. When spills take place, clean up immediately. Dispose of trash in right containers. Keep sprinklers, fire exits and fire extinguishers accessible. Put box cutters and other sharp tools away soon after using. Report tripping hazards such as loose or damaged flooring.
